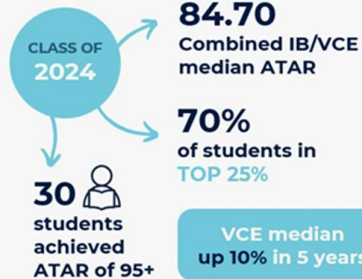

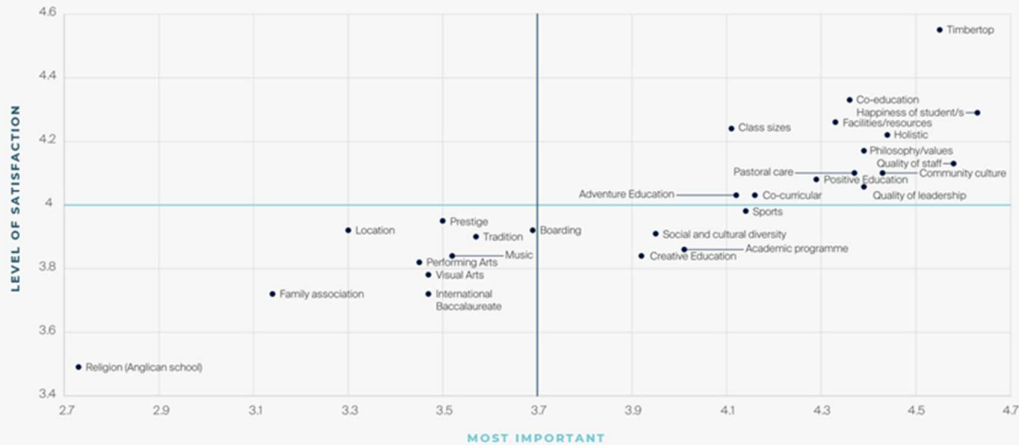

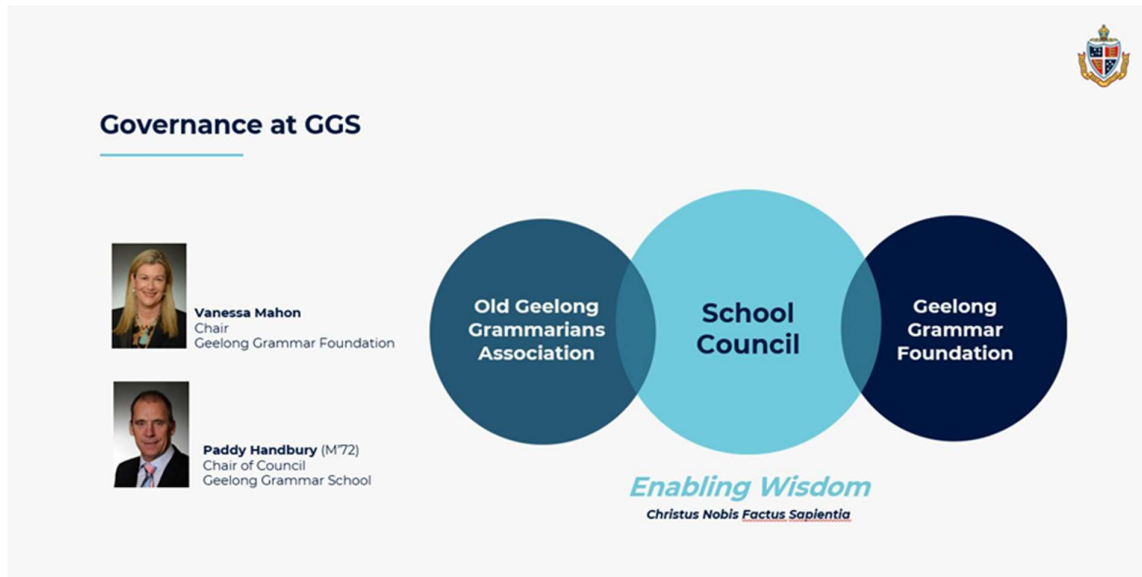

My gratitude also extends warmly to School governance broadly, and especially to:

- Vanessa Mahon (Chair of Foundation for her zeal in enlivening our philanthropic efforts); and
- Paddy Handbury (Chair of Council for his decency, care, humility and wisdom).

2025 Commencement Comment

As a final comment, noting it is May, the Principal offered a brief commentary on the commencement of 2025.

Before offering celebrations of our year thus far, the Principal noted it was appropriate to mention a tragedy. The death of Troy Selwood, our dear colleague, has been a critical incident and trauma for our community. We continue to grieve his loss.

- Enrolment application numbers remain strong, with year-to-date applications (428) tracking 6.5% below the record numbers of 2023 and 4.6% above 2022 applications
- Demand for Timbertop remains high, with 2025 applications closed for male students in March (125 applications for 41 available places)
- Ongoing philanthropic energy has started superbly with donations totalling
 - \$498,647, and significant gift pledges confirmed for lead Timbertop Masterplan project
- Junior School at Corio progress is astonishing and on track for our 2026 opening and Governor of Victoria Professor Margaret Gardner tree planting
- An overall highlight to date has been hosting G30 delegates and experiencing GGS through their eyes.
- Our 2025 School Captains Leonie Kosasi-Papdan and Spencer Siebel are already proving to be a mature and effective partnership, winning the hearts and minds of our G30 visitors and the Governor of Victoria.



Overall, an excellent commencement to 2025 and the year's overarching theme of *Thrive in '25!*



The Chair thanked those Members of the Geelong Grammar Foundation who remained for the delivery of the Principal's Report as the first item of business in the School's Annual General Meeting.

The meeting was paused whilst Members of the Geelong Grammar Foundation exited the meeting.

3. Chair's Report

The Chair provided the Chair's Report for the calendar year 2024.

It gives me great pleasure to speak to you about 2024 – much has been said by our Principal and much will be added by our Executive Director Operations and Shared Services.

Junior School

We were able to commence the construction of the Junior School, after an unbelievable battle with red/green tape, which I might add continues with the construction continuing on a planning permit to planning permit basis. Having visited the site, you can already feel just how special a place for



learning, this new precinct, will be for our little ones. Hopefully it will be finished by the end February 2026, ready for Term 2, 2026.

TGI

TGI continues to develop for 2027, as we finalise the rearrangement of the campus to accommodate Year 7 and then 8. This includes the development of the weekly program for these years and just where they might be on any given day, encompassing our three pillars – Adventure, Positivity and Creativity.

Cricket

Back to back Premierships 2023/24 – not since 1961/62 – we have won 10 premierships since 1903.

Rowing

Girls 1st won back to back 2023/24. The girls have won the HoR 25 times since 1985 and 14 times since 2000. They have done a ‘threepeat’ winning again in 2025.

Academics

Another stellar year which sees our VCE results 10 ATAR above 2019 and our overall results up 5. Academics is becoming like success at sport – something to be admired and aimed for.

Payroll Tax

APS working with ISV and Redbridge – no success to date but what has come out of it is the clear belief that this a tax on education and the aspirational parent doesn’t like it.

VIVA

We presented to the enquiry into this proposed floating gas terminal. This was very well put and I think well received, but you never know with these enquiries. I thought it was a no brainer on the presentation and evidence provide – we’ll see as the recommendation is with the Minister. The School should be proud of taking the leadership role in this.

VRQA

A very long-winded, time-consuming process with the auditor not really having any idea of the size and spread of our boarding school. Perhaps they have learn from the experience and knowledge imparted to them.

Boarding accreditation has subsequently been received and to operate until 2029.

Although wonderful news, as it is, we must continue to operate with heightened vigilance, regulation and the absolute focus, as it should be, on student safety and wellbeing. Clearly, this heightens the conventions, principles and guidelines under which we must operate.

Obviously this doesn’t just happen. It takes the work of an extremely dedicated, resourceful, diligent and resilient management team and executive to steer and hold such a challenging course. And, of course, success can only be achieved with the support of the entire GGS team. What a wonderful group we have – they ensure that our students are given optimal opportunities to fulfil their full potential.

I thank our Principal, Rebecca Cody, and all our marvellous staff members for the extraordinary lengths they go to in ensuring we deliver on our promise of an Exceptional Education for all students.

The School continues – as it must – to approach its sensitive handling of historical sexual abuse claims in a survivor-focused, trauma-informed and model litigant manner. The vital focus is to



ensure that any and all severely damaged people are treated in an empathetic and caring way, in order for them to have the best chance of leading as normal lives as possible. Perhaps, even, to return to the School and the community when and if they are ready, for them to be assured the school has changed and to know that the Council is determined that abuse will never again be perpetrated on anyone at our School.

As you would be aware from the financial data that historical abuse survivor claims make a material impact on our bottom line. The School has settled 62 claims, to date, and at a cost of \$50m. The impact would be far worse if not for the extraordinary work carried out by Bronwen Charleson, Executive Director of Safeguarding and Legal Services and Company Secretary, and her staff, particularly Laura Shandley, in ensuring that our past insurers support the school. Thank you.

It has been a tough year with the aforementioned impact but with the steady hand of Fiona Holmes, Executive Director Operations and Shared Services, and her team, especially Caitlin Maithison and Andrew King, we continue to expediently control the finances. Fiona has had a material impact on the administration/finance operations of the school, bringing it from notebooks and abacus to the digital era. When asking for funding for something you feel like you it's coming out of Fiona's purse! Thank you.

The generosity of the School community was again on display during 2023, with donations through the GGS Foundation and Biddlecombe Society exceeding two million dollars. We are so grateful for this generosity as it allows the School to deliver on its scholarship program and master plan. And I thank Vanessa Mahon for her dedicated and enthusiastic leadership as the Foundation prepares for the future campaign.

Andrew Burgess; for your ongoing support of the school through your Presidency of the OGG's and you valued input at Council.

Fellow Council Members; to you all, thank you for your continued support to develop and grow the School, ensuring the School's viability and sustainability and ensuring we maintain our fiscal and corporate governance obligations.

The fact you give so freely of your time and expertise really says it all; your generosity is greatly appreciated. Thank you.

Leavers Celebration:

I found the day so uplifting, seeing these nicely confident, enthusiastic, mature and happy young people so excited about what lies ahead for them.

I was really taken by the sermon delivered in the morning chapel, by Lulu Harris. What she had to say epitomizes what this School is about. I could not do it any better. We are a truly unique School. We are different from any other school that I know of in Australia and I believe are product is very different.

Paraphrasing what Lulu said: Whilst you are here, you learn the skills of resilience, respect, consideration, hard work, friendship, the ability to be challenged and to challenge yourself and you learn the strength that comes from living in and contributing to a community.

What a wonderful credit to all our staff, Council, Foundation and the students.



4. Election of Directors

5. Financial Statements & Reports

The Executive Director | Operations and Shared Services, Fiona Holmes presented the financial statements for the year ending 31 December 2024.

The GGS and Controlled entities accounts are unqualified and represent a true and accurate picture of the School & associated entities.

Earnings before depreciation and interest (EBIDA) increased by \$1.8m YOY, the actual EBIDA being \$17.5m, with a reported total deficit of \$1.3m.

2024 saw the commencement of a significant number of major capital projects with building works for the Corio Junior School commencing and scheduled for completion in early 2026. This project will showcase the School's ambitions in sustainability and includes a kitchen garden, passive ventilation, passive shading, rainwater harvesting, efficient fixtures, underfloor heating, native planting palette, Australian made solar system and night sky compliant external lighting.

The School is very grateful to the Foundation who gifted the School almost half the cost of the project.

The Corio Link Road represents a significant student safeguarding project with upgrades to:

- the Ernest Clarke Pavilion and Allen House car parks, separating pedestrian and vehicle movements.
- installation of bitumen surfaces, kiss and drop zones and dedicated bus bays.
- creation of a link to the new Corio Junior School.

It is scheduled for completion in early 2026.

The Fire Services Infrastructure Upgrade project at Timbertop commenced in early 2025 and will see the installation of two significant water storage tanks and an associated hydrant network. Work continues on the design of the first project within the Timbertop Masterplan being the Library and OES upgrade.

Student enrolments continue to rebuild, particularly at Corio where many year levels are full, and overseas student numbers are almost back to pre-Covid levels, with Timbertop continuing to have a significant surplus of demand over supply. The major adverse impact (numbers of enrolments below trend) is being felt at Toorak. Work continues on the Toorak Glamorgan Initiative, to reintroduce Years 7 and 8 at Toorak, and is supported by a comprehensive marketing campaign. The Masterplan process seeking parental engagement as to the opportunities for reimagining the use of the infrastructure at Toorak to support Years 7 and 8, was completed in the second half of 2024.

2024 Statement of Comprehensive Income:

- The School delivered an operating deficit in 2024 of \$7.8m (improvement of \$1.8m), but the Foundation delivered a surplus of \$5.9m (down \$2.6m) with the commencement of the gift to the School for Corio Junior School increasing endowments. The Building and Library Funds delivered a combined surplus of \$0.6m for the year (up \$0.4m)
- Within the Foundation, 2024 saw a reduction in donations (down \$2.5m) and an increase in investment returns (up \$1.5m).
- Within the core School accounts, total revenue increased \$8.8m (fees increase - student numbers and fee level, with an associated increase in concession costs) as did NCCD



funding, staff costs increased, up \$5.0m (half year of payroll tax, some headcount increases plus pay and super increases of 3.5%), other operating costs increased by \$2.1m (driven by tuition cost, catering, cleaning and utilities increases).

- The provision for and cost of historical harm claims increased YOY by \$1.2m.
- The revaluation movement linked to investments for the defined benefit obligation was favourable \$0.15m.
- Government funding was \$11.1m, vs \$9.7m in 2023 due to the aforementioned increase in NCCD funding (individualised funding due to disability).

Cashflow (School):

Net closing cash (overdraft) for the School was -\$8.1m, a usage of cash for the year of \$12.7m. The School has borrowings at the end of 2024 of \$10.5m with cash usage from operating activities of \$6.2m for 2024 and capital expenditure driving an outflow of \$6.5m.

Capital investment for the year included routine capital spend of \$3.1m plus Corio Junior School, classroom refurbishments, the initial works for Corio Darling Quad amenities, Chemistry preparation laboratories upgrade and the Darling Hall ceiling replacement.

The consolidated entity accounts for the year ended December 31st, 2024, showed a comprehensive deficit of \$1.3m, vs a comprehensive deficit in 2023 of \$0.9m.

The auditors confirm there are no issues in relation to going concern.

The School is focussed on delivering a sustainable financial outcome supported by considered investment decisions focussed on enhancing the experience and outcomes for students. Successful student outcomes remain a priority, and the School continues to invest for their benefit.

The Future:

The context for the School's financial performance in 2025 will be influenced by the outcome of the local Federal election and the US tariff decisions. The US decisions are currently causing uncertainty across the globe with the outcomes for the Australian economy at this stage unknown but likely to be heavily influenced by the outcomes for China.

Enrolments overall have started at similar levels to 2024 and as stated above are encouraging at Corio and Timbertop with Toorak posing the challenge.

We will receive a sizeable increase in our government funding this year as the measure for determining parent capacity to contribute dropped which increases our funding, plus the School will receive additional funding for students requiring learning support.

Overall financial delivery is forecast to increase but remains behind the long-term target. We continue to focus on cost conscious decision taking to ensure we prioritise investments to support exceptional student outcomes.

The Value proposition project has progressed well and is reviewing the School's value proposition and its relationship to costs to support ongoing investment in identified priority areas.

6. Appointment of Auditor

The Chair confirmed that the current auditor, Grant Thornton offers itself for re-appointment and the Board of Geelong Grammar School Limited recommends that Grant Thornton be appointed as auditor.



The Chair stated the School Finance Team, ably led by Fiona Holmes, has worked closely with Grant Thornton undertaking the audits for both the School and the Foundation. The Directors are grateful to the team at Grant Thornton, led by Crystel Gangemi, for their continued excellent work and assistance to the School. Grant Thornton have approved and consent to act as auditor

The following motion was proposed and members were asked to vote according.

Motion: That Grant Thornton be appointed as the auditor of Geelong Grammar School Limited for the year ended 31 December 2025.

The Chair thanked and congratulated Grant Thornton on its re-appointment as auditors of Geelong Grammar School Limited.

7. Any Other Business

The Chair asked Members present if they wished to raise any matters or questions for consideration.

Alex Morgan, parent of Toorak Captain William Morgan enquired as to the progress of the planned development for Years 7 and 8 and asked if there had been changes to the programme.

By referral from the Chair, Principal Rebecca Cody thanked Mr Morgan for his question and confirmed that there has been a change with regard to the programme in that the School is placing its attention on the learning and teaching offering.

Ms Cody acknowledged that the Year 7 and 8 programme will not be for every student, however, it will attend to a niche which the Toorak campus has been asking for across a number of years. Ms Cody observed that the School had looked at the masterplanning and whilst there could be benefits in refurbishments on the campus, the School is focussing its energies on the implementation and opportunity of the programme for students. She noted too that the School has much happening from a capital perspective and the essence of the programme for Years 7 and 8 at the Toorak campus does not depend on buildings.

Ms Cody informed that the colour and movement currently being shaped within the programme is strongly aligned with the School's Philosophy and what the School seeks to provide for learning for its students at this age and stage.
